Dr. Hallman Martini is an Assistant Professor of English and Writing Center Coordinator at Salem State University in Salem, Massachusetts. She completed her PhD at the University of Houston, and continues to collaborate with writing center stakeholders in Texas, so her connections to the SCWCA region are remain present.



Hallman Martini's scholarly work has appeared or is forthcoming in *Praxis: A Writing Center* Journal, Open Words: Access and English Studies, Writing and Composing in the Age of MOOCs, and What It Means to Be RAD: Embracing Replicable, Aggregable, and Data-Driven Writing Center Research. She received the 2015 Moores Professors and Teaching Excellence Award in the category of Graduate Teaching Assistant at the University of Houston and was the 2015 recipient of the International Writing Center Association Ben Rafoth Graduate Research Grant for her dissertation: "Listening to Stories About Writing (Centers): Sites of Innovation in (Online) Writing Instruction."

National Conference on Peer Tutoring in Writing

November 2-4, 2018 South Padre Island, Rio Grande Valley, Texas

Movement, Migration, Sustainability

Who gets to travel, for recreation, hobbies, personal fulfillment, intellectual growth, or profit? And who has to travel, to make a living, or to escape war, other violence, poor living conditions, shortages, environmental degradation, etc.? In the most extreme cases, genocide, ethnic cleansing, and human trafficking may all include people being forcibly moved from one place to another. Meanwhile, unless we are directly cultivating them to feed ourselves, the non-human species that inhabit our planet are, if not extinguished altogether, being forced to occupy smaller and smaller portions of it. This bodes especially ill for those species who need to make regular seasonal, transnational migrations.

This focus on migration will invite, and when necessary, implore, peer tutors and scholars alike to not only consider their own experiences and materialities of writing, but to explore the reciprocal effects of writers, objects, and spaces. Additionally, considering our border location and students' self-identification as multilingual, multimodal, and transnational learners, a multilingual and translingual perspective to writing tutoring can organically help us to think about how students write in multiple genres, how to effectively respond to their writing as they negotiate diverse contexts, and how teachers and tutors can negotiate various translingual rhetorical situations alongside with them. Potential questions for this conference include: What are the borders - national, linguistic, economic, etc. - that shape, inform, and inhibit the work of writing centers? How do the material spaces of writing centers impacts student writing? What can writing center learn from students identifying with groups and language practices traditionally marginalized by the academy? What are the considerations of bodies and movement on writing and tutoring work? We welcome papers on all subjects, including but not limited to subjects suggested by the themes of movement, migration, and sustainability.
